

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






The Illustrious Awards

Quality Research for Effective Advocacy

The Illustrious Latinos project is a multifaceted research initiative of *The Institute for Latino Studies at Berkeley College* to document and highlight the contributions of Latinos to the advancement of the United States of America.

The research project consists of three installments - 2016, 2017 & 2018, three award ceremonies, three commemorative journals, a 500-page journal compilation and an original documentary featuring the life stories and portrayals of the outstanding Latinos who received Illustrious Awards.

In September 2019, The Institute will host a grandiose ceremony to release the 500-page commemorative journal compilation and to premiere *The Illustrious* documentary showcasing all of the 2016, 2017 & 2018 Illustrious Awards recipients.

Each recipient is presented with one of two different award statues carefully chosen by ILS: both are 18" Resin Male or Female Abstract Sculpture on Base-Hammered Painted Finish Silver, depicting a

naked man or a woman standing, looking straight forward; one statue shows relaxed arms alongside the body, and chest upright; the other shows arms crossed on chest. The projection is one of simplicity, openness, imperfection, sense of completion, confidence and vulnerability.

The award statues convey illustriousness; and are presented only to deserving imperfect individuals who have done meaningful acts that inspire respect and admiration.

The word *illustrious* means being eminent, distinguished, acclaimed, notable, noteworthy, prominent, preeminent, foremost, leading, important, influential, renowned, famous, famed, well-known, celebrated, legendary, esteemed, honored, venerable, august, highly regarded, well-thought-of, of distinction, brilliant, glorious, stellar...

Illustrious people are far from perfect; however, they light up everything around them.



We share the same language, but with some dialectal variations. We represent all the races in the rainbow. We are Latino Americans.



he Illustrious Latinos project aims at documenting and highlighting the contributions of Latinos to the United States in the areas of arts, business, communications, education, government, judiciary & law, the military, leadership, literature, medicine, politics, religion, humanities, social sciences, advocacy and sports. The nomination process was opened and announced in January 2018 with a deadline of June 30, 2018. Nominations of recipients were made by boards of education, institutions of higher learning, private sector corporations, professional associations, organizations, chambers of commerce, community organizations, government institutions, and the general public in the identified fields of work.

Hundreds of nominations were received by the Institute for Latino Studies (ILS). Every nominee was formally notified based on contact information provided.

The ILS' Illustrious Selection Committee, composed of members of ILS Board of Directors, reputable advisors, and distinguished leaders, conducted a four-step screening process based on the following criteria:

- 1. Nominee must be of Latino descent.
- 2. Nominee has at least twenty years of experience in her/his field (years of experience may be substituted by 5 years per 1 major accom-
- 3. Nominee must have at least one major accomplishment in her/his field.

The first step was to screen for qualification as per criteria; screening resulted in reducing the number of nominees as listed

on pages 16 &17.

The second step was to expand selected fields to include sub-divisions, based on areas of nominees' expertise (education was expanded to include administration, faculty, higher and elementary education, etc.).

The third step was to select the top-five nominees in each category and sub-cat-

The fourth and final step was to select one honoree per category and sub-category.

Finalists submitted their resumes, and signed a release consent to formally grant permission to ILS, officers and partners to be photographed and interviewed on video and film formats. All interviews, conducted at Berkeley College, Hostos Community College and Borough of Manhattan Community College, were structured and guided by a rigorous qualitative research method. Their life stories and major contributions were video featured and highlighted in the 2018 Illustrious Awards Ceremony. They are included in this Collectible Tribute Journal and made available online. They are featured in the film-documentary, The Illustrious, whose world premiere has been set for 2019.

The selection process was lengthy, meticulous, comprehensive, and at times, demanding, even humbling. It caused us to rethink some of its aspects, and challenged us to be as accurate as possible in matching merit to area of expertise.

After the process was completed, and all details of the ceremony were tackled, the Illustrious 2018 emerged triumphant as the latest cohort of distinguished honorees to receive Illustrious Awards.

On behalf of Babylion Productions, the Institute for Latino Studies and our partners this year, the Center for Puerto Rican Studies at Hunter College and the Center for Latin American, Caribbean & Latino Studies at the Graduate School of The City University of New York, I encourage you, your family, friends, students and conscientious people to preserve this commemorative-collectible-research journal as a rare unprecedented-must-have research treasure highlighting unsung Latino heroes whose stories, successful professions and contributions have indeed made the United States great and, more importantly, a better place to raise a family, build prosperity, live in peace, practice religion, and pursue happiness along many years to come.

Dr. María Teresa & Néstor Montilla, Sr.

long the past three decades, Dr. María Teresa and Néstor Montilla Sr. have joined efforts to spearhead a national advocacy movement for the socio-economic and political advancement of the people of the Americas.

Néstor Montilla, Sr. has worked in various higher education administration positions at The City University of New York (CUNY), the largest public urban university system in the United States. Currently, he manages adjunct faculty affairs in the Office of the Provost and Academic Affairs at Lehman College, one of the 24 CUNY campuses in New York City.

Previously, he held different directorship positions in government relations, community development, public relations, and international programs and community relations; he also taught at the University as an adjunct faculty. His early career at CUNY includes advisory roles and assisting the Senior Vice Chancellor for University Relations, and being a television producer for public affairs on CUNY Channel 75. His credits include Emmy Award nominations and conceptualizing a multiple Emmy award-winning television series about Latinos in New York. After studying cinematography, graduating from High School and attending law school at the Central University of the East, Dominican Republic. Montilla moved to the United States, where he graduated from college with high honors, earning an associate's degree from Hostos Community College, and both, a bachelor's degree and a Master of Public Administration with specialization in Human Resources and Management from John Jay College of Criminal Justice. Subsequently, he pursued a Ph.D. in Political Science with specialization in American Government and Public

Dr. María Teresa Montilla is the founder and president of The Institute for Latino Studies, Research and Development, whose main undertaking is to study, disseminate and develop the rich literary, intellectual, and cultural heritage of Latinos in the United States.

She has an established career in management with the New Jersey Superior Court, where she served in various positions along twenty-eight years, including official court interpreter, probation officer, and administrator.

María Teresa has extensive experience in training and teaching, having taught courses in behavioral sciences at Fairleigh Dickinson University, The Christian University of New Jersey, New Covenant University in Florida, and Latin University of Theology in Bridgeport, Connecticut.

Her experience in community outreach and organizing spans over two decades, and includes proven leadership that has resulted in creation of community based organizations, influencing of public policy and attaining political representation at all levels of government.

She has authored a book, Latina y Evangélica in the United States, an analysis of how the church and the Latino culture form an 'effective alliance' of oppression against women; and co-authored with Néstor, two others: New Jersey Dominicans: A Decade of Accomplishments; an account of Dominican migration to New Jersey, its causes and accomplishments, and Los Panfleteros de Santiago (Santiago's Pamphleteers), the story of

a rebel youth movement during the Trujillo dictatorship in the Dominican Republic. Additionally, she has written many teaching manuals, including: *The Church as Agent of Social Change, The Church and Sexual Abuse, and Why do I do What I Do?*, a personality type identification tool.

María Teresa has a bachelor's degree in Psychology from Thomas Edison College in Trenton, NJ, two Masters Degrees, one in Public Administration from Fairleigh Dickinson University, Teaneck, New Jersey, and a second in Christian Counseling from New Covenant International University, from where she also obtained a Doctorate in Theology.

Néstor and María Teresa have become social entrepreneurs and political strategists. They advance their honorable cause via founding and leading advocacy organizations; implementing programs and initiatives that identify and mentor new generations of leaders; and leading by example to have Latinos occupy their rightful place in US society. María Teresa and Néstor have contributed enormously to make Dominicans and Latinos part of a nationwide discourse on the future of this country and their place in it, as partners.

"It seems clear to me that many of the gains we have made on the electoral markets and the rise of many of our co-ethnics to positions of prominence in the municipal, state and federal spheres of government, have benefited from the measure of devotion the Montillas have invested in creating fora of various sorts to advance a dialogue that expands our views of what is politically possible for us, as an ethnic community," noted Silvio Torres-Saillant, Ph.D., founding director of the CUNY's Dominican Studies Institute and current Dean's Professor in the Humanities, Director of Undergraduate Studies at Syracuse University.

In 2014, Néstor Montilla, Sr. was a candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives seeking to represent Congressional District 9 in New Jersey, while María Teresa was a candidate for Mayor of Paterson, the third largest city in New Jersey.

Some of the programs and initiatives the Montillas have conceptualized, spearheaded and/or implemented include:

- Conducting quality research studies about the migratory experience in the Americas. A partial list includes: New Jersey Dominicans: A Decade of Accomplishment, Los Panfleteros de Santiago; African American Settlements in Samana; Jewish-Dominican Generations, and The Illustrious Latinos.
- Leading the Latino Leadership Alliance of New Jersey, the Dominican American National Roundtable (DANR), and launching the National Dominican American Council (NDAC).
- Coordinating dozens of national conventions and leadership conferences; publishing numerous conference journals; implementing U.S Census count of Latinos awareness campaign, and conducting voter registration drives.
- Advocating for fair political representation through the re-districting process; and advocating for the passage of legislation.
- Establishing collaborative partnership among the Latino Leadership Alliance, the Institute for Latino Studies and Berkeley College to materialize endeavors of mutual interest, including the *Latino Leadership Academy*, an intense ten-month leadership course, devoted to train new generations of leaders.

Mission

The Institute for Latino Studies, Research & Development, Inc., (ILS) at Berkeley College, is a non-profit entity, recognized by the federal government as a 501 c(3) organization. ILS' main undertaking is to study, research, document, develop and highlight the rich heritage and contributions of Latinos in the United States. This goal is achieved through advocacy and the implementation of in-house and outreach programs, research projects, initiatives and activities.

Objectives

The Institute for Latino Studies at Berkeley College demonstrates its commitment to its mission by becoming an effective community resource, which enhances the knowledge and awareness of Latino endeavors within the framework of a multicultural society. Through unity of purpose, its Board of Directors, staff and dedicated volunteers help forge a brighter future for the Latino community in the United States. Since its founding in 2001, ILS has endeavored to carry out programs, initiatives and activities that improve the quality of life of the Latino community. ILS is indeed dedicated to quality research for better advocacy.

Research

The Institute conducts studies and research of social & population trends to shape the composition of institutions of learning, legislature, and business landscape in the state and beyond.

Documentaries & Publications

First socio-economic, demographic study of New Jersey Dominicans conducted in joined efforts with Dr. Ramona Hernández, Director of the CUNY Dominican Studies Institute, and Rev. Alejandro Benjamin, professor at Bergen County Community College.

New Jersey Dominicans: A Decade of Accomplishments - A book and documentary about the journey of Dominicans to New Jersey, beginning in 1947. Researched and produced by Dr. María Teresa and Néstor Montilla, Sr.

Dominicans in New Jersey: A community on the move – A visual history exhibit of Dominicans in New Jersey, their journey and accomplishments since the 1940s. It is the first exhibition in New Jersey honoring one of the state's newest communities, which is predominately located in Passaic, Essex, Union, Hudson and Middlesex counties.

Los Panfleteros de Santiago (Santiago's Pamphleteers) - a 150 page book and 57 minute-documentary about 32 youngsters who rebelled against the regime of dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo in 1960. They were captured, tortured and dismembered for a cause—a free and inclusive society. Researched and produced by Dr. María Teresa and Néstor Montilla, Sr. based on testimonies by Dr. Ramón Antonio Veras (El Negro Veras).

Jewish Dominican Generations - A short documentary about the story of the first persecuted Jews who were welcomed, protected and embraced in the Dominican Republic in the late 1930's. Today, thousands worldwide can trace their family heritage to the Jews of Sosua. Researched and produced by Néstor Montilla, Sr.

African American Settlement in Samaná - A 28 minute-documentary about the untold story of thousands freed U.S. slaves who settled in Hispaniola in 1824. Researched and produced by Néstor Montilla, Sr.

Dominican Identity and Migrations to Hispaniola - A film documentary by Néstor Montilla, Sr., about the roots of the different ethnic groups, including Arabic, African, Jewish and Asian migration as well as the cultural influence of Haitians and U.S. greed-slaves to this Caribbean island. Dr. Irma Nicasio, Sociology professor from the Autonomous University of Santo Domingo (UASD), historian Frank Moya Pons, Ph.D., Silvio Torres-Saillant, Ph.D., and other prominent scholars participate in the film.

Diaspora & Identity - a 57-minute documentary about the influence of the Diaspora on Dominican identity, Researched and produced by Néstor Montilla, Sr.

Carlos A. Cooks & Black Pride - A 15-minutes documentary about the contribution of David Cook to the Civil Rights Movement and 'Black Pride.' Researched and produced by Néstor Montilla, Sr.

Melaza & Sol - A 57- minute docu-drama about the journey of a Dominican boy from Barahona to the United States and back. Written by Alejandro Benjamin and to be produced by Néstor Montilla, Sr. (in production stage).

Certificate Programs

ILS' certificate programs offer 50-hours of intensive training by experts in the target field with value of 3 college credit hours.

LAMP - Latino Youth Leadership Mentoring Program - A statewide 10-month youth leadership development program aiming to provide leadership development to Latino youth between the ages of 14 to 17, through "hands-on" experiences.

The Office - Youth Professional Mentoring Program - A statewide youth professional mentoring aiming to provide job readiness to Latino youth between the ages of 14 to 17, through basic office/job interview/computer use instruction; and 40 hours of professional mentoring, where participants 'shadow' a professional in their selected field.

LALEA - Latino Leadership Academy - A statewide ten-month leadership program to identify and prepare local leaders to enable them to serve in a more holistic manner.

The Business Bridge & Incubator - A certificate in entrepreneurship program (Low-Income Fast Track). This 6-week business plan boot camp is geared to help participants fine tune their business plan and prepare for the incubator, which provides a complete array of management support and business ser-


