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

Frank Bonilla, Ph.D., born in 1925 in NYC, pioneered Puerto Rican and Latino studies in US academia.

ntonio Pérez, Ph.D. was appointed President of Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC/CUNY) in 1995. The college served 16,300 students at that time, and has grown to have the college largest enrollment in The City University of New York, serving more than 27,000 students.

A visionary, high-energy leader, President Pérez has not only led the college's expansion but guided the BMCC community through the aftermath of September 11, 2001. BMCC is the only college in United States history to have lost a campus building to a terrorist attack. BMCC's Fiterman Hall was destroyed when World Trade 7, across the street, collapsed and fell against it. That building was closed, the College's main campus building became a staging area for 2,000 rescue workers and through President Pérez's determined advocacy, BMCC reopened in less than three weeks.

For the next ten years, President Pérez worked to procure funding to raze and rebuild Fiterman Hall. He was a key player in creating a partnership between the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York, the Office of NYC Mayor Michael Bloomberg, The City University of New York, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the NYS Department of Labor, the NYC Department of Transportation and others. The result was the opening of a new Fiterman Hall in August 2012.

President Pérez has spoken and written widely on leadership during a crisis and issues affecting community college students. He has led the development of programs at BMCC that increase the participation of women and low-income students in the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) fields, as well as programs that prepare students to enter high-demand fields such as nursing and allied health. He has been a driving force behind BMCC's growing Study Abroad program. Under his leadership, the number of associate degree programs at BMCC has doubled, growing from 20 to 47, as of Fall 2017.

President Pérez has also developed a network of partnerships in the NYC business community, strengthening programs in the BMCC Center for Continuing Education and Workforce Development. Serving more 11,000 students, the Center offers nationally recognized certifications in information technology, allied health and other in-demand fields, as well as stackable credits that trans- fer into degree programs at BMCC.

President Pérez has maintained a deep personal commitment to community service. He has served on boards including those of the Ralph Lauren Cancer Center, Business Alliance for Downtown New York, National Museum of the American Indian and Lower Manhattan Cultural Council. President Pérez is Vice President of the Greater New York Councils of Boy Scouts of America and was recognized by Crain's New York as one of the City's top 100 minority business leaders.

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Mathematics


berto Correa, Ph.D., was born in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, and settled in Puerto Rico, where he raised a family and obtained an education. Due to his blackness, he was discriminated against at every step of the way, as he pursued a college education. He eventually graduated with a Ph.D. in Mathematics and gained fame for his teaching skills and relentless commitment to the advancement of students of all ages. His lectures on mathematics focus on leadership development, applying mathematical concepts.

Dr. Alberto Correa received a Bachelor's Degree in Mathematics from World University of Puerto Rico, Recinto de Hato Rey in 1978; a Master's Degree in Education-Mathematics from Universidad de Puerto Rico in 1982; and a Doctorate in Education-Mathematics from Universidad Interamericana de Puerto Rico in 1999.

Among the many accolades and recognition, he has received, Dr. Correa's Doctoral Thesis was incorporated to the Colección Puertorriqueña de la Universidad de Puerto Rico, Recinto de Río Piedras (2000);

He is currently a Professor at Universidad Interamericana de Puerto Rico. He has lectured at various universities in Spain and mainland USA. He is educational advisor to Asociación de Profesionales y Técnicos Dominicanos en España (ASOPROTEC), the National Dominican American Council, and the Dominican American National Roundtable (DANR).

vid A. Badillo, Ph.D. is the son of the late Herman Badillo, the pioneering politician who played a key role in the New York political establishment and the Puerto Rican and Latino communities. A historian and educator, Dr. David Badillo is Chair of the Latin American and Latino Studies Department at Lehman College (CUNY).

His parents imbued him with an intellectual curiosity with which he pursued higher education, partly as a means of exploring his Latino ancestry. This was especially the case after he became interested in the beauty and grandeur of South America while traveling there in the mid-1970s. Thereafter, he developed and fulfilled professional goals through research and the writing of Latino history.

Professor Badillo earned his BA from the University of California at Berkeley and his doctorate in history from the City University of New York. He was a postdoctoral fellow at Stanford University and has published extensively, authoring a book entitled Latinos and the New Immigrant Church (Johns Hopkins University Press) and numerous scholarly articles on various aspects of Latino history which have appeared in the Journal of Urban History, the Journal of American Ethnic History, and New York History and other venues.

His current book project is a comparative history of the Latino civil rights movement focusing on educational litigation, legal advocacy of immigrant rights, and struggles for equal employment opportunities.

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innetta Candelario, Ph.D., is a Professor of Sociology and of Latin

American & Latino/a Studies at Smith College. Of Dominican/Italian descent, Professor Candelario credits her mother with being the major influence in her life.

In addition to being a professor of sociology, Dr. Candelario is a faculty affiliate of the Latin American and Latina/o Studies Program, the Study of Women and Gender Program, and the Community Engagement and Social Change Concentration.

Candelario's research interests include Dominican history and society, with a focus on national identity formation and women's history; Blackness in the Americas; Latin American, Caribbean and Latina feminisms; and Latino communities, particularly Cuban, Dominican and Puerto Rican.

Her first book, Black behind the ears: Dominican Racial Identity from Museums to Beauty Shops, was published by Duke University Press in 2007 and received the 2009 Best Book Award from the Latino Studies Section of the Latin American Studies Association and the 2008 Best Book Award from the New England Council of Latin American Studies.

Candelario's work has also appeared in interdisciplinary journals such as Latino Studies, West Indian Guide, Small Axe, Meridians: Feminism, Race, Transnationalism, Phoebe, and in Latina/o studies anthologies, among others.

Classical Studies Scholarship

an-el Padilla, Ph.D. was born in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, Dan-el Padilla Peralta grew up undocumented and temporarily homeless in New York City. With the support and encouragement of his high school teachers, he studied Classics at Princeton University, where he graduated as the salutatorian of his class. He continued his studies at the University of Oxford (MPhil in Greek and Roman History) and Stanford University (PhD in Classics). After two years at Columbia University's Society of Fellows, Dan-el returned to Princeton as an assistant professor in the Classics Department and is affiliated with the university's Program in Latino Studies.

His 2015 memoir Undocumented: A Dominican Boy's Odyssey from Homeless Shelter to Ivy League (Penguin) received an Alex Award from the American Library Association; more recently he has penned pieces for the Guardian, Matter, Vox, and the New York Times.

He is now plugging away at a second book on the religious worlds of the Roman Republic (under contract with Princeton University Press); other projects in gestation include a co-edited volume on appropriation in Roman culture, two article-length explorations of classical reception in the 19th and 20th-century Hispanophone Caribbean, and a study of forms of citizenship ancient and modern.

A firm believer in the importance of humanistic learning to the promotion of social justice, Dan-el has taught in Columbia's Justice-in-Education Initiative and Freedom and Citizenship Seminar. He also sits on the editorial board of the public-facing Classics journal Eidolon, to which he has contributed articles ranging from Greco-Roman reception in hip-hop to the interplay between ancient xenophobia and modern anti-immigrant politics.

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Linguistics Research

afael Núñez Cedeño, Ph.D., is emeritus professor of Hispanic linguistics in the Department of Hispanic & Italian Studies, University of Illinois-Chicago. He has authored or coauthored several books and has published in anthologies, encyclopedias, newspapers, magazines, and linguistic journals.

Nuñez-Cedeño is a researcher who specializes in linguistics, with focused interest in Spanish phonology, morphology, dialectology, and the development of Spanish phonology.

He was born in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic to José Antonio Núñez y María Altagracia Cedeño. He attended high school at Academia Militar Batalla de Las Carreras, where he was granted a scholarship to study aviation in Lackland, Texas. In1965, during the US invasion of the Dominican Republic, Nuñez joined the resistance forces under Commander Caamaño Deñó, as a member of Servicio de Inteligencia Militar Revolucionario.

Nuñez-Cedeño migrated to the United States, New York City in late 1965, and began his career as a linguist, philosopher and educator. He attained a Bachelor's Degree in Education and Hispanic Literature, as well as a Master's Degree in Linguistics from The City University of New York; and a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota.

He is co-founder and co-editor of *Probus: International Journal of Romance Linguistics*, published in Berlín, Germany, and is associate editor of *Signos Lingüísticos*, of México, *Miríada Hispánica*, of Spain, *Modern Language Journal*, of the United States, and *País Cultural*, of the Dominican Republic. Nuñez-Cedeño has been a guest lecturer at University of Minnesota-Dultuh, Indiana University, University of New Hampshire, Boston University, Universidad Central de Venezuela, Universidad de Los Andes y Universidad de Maracaibo de Venezuela, Universidad Autónoma Metropolitana of México, Colegio de México, Colegio de Michoacán, México y Pontificia Universidad Católica Madre y Maestra.

His community affiliations include founding and presiding the Dominican American Midwest Association (DAMA), and being a member of the Dominican American National Roundtable and Chicago Cultural Alliance.


An existential purpose enabled him to surmount obstacles encountered during his adolescent years. This became the foundation for his multifaceted professional services to the youth and families of his community. Dr. Hernandez had the fortune of working as a bilingual, special education teacher for 13 years, and later as a guidance counselor for 22 years in El Barrio, NY his place of birth and upbringing.

He majored in Puerto Rican Studies in undergraduate school, and received two Master's degrees, one in Bilingual Special Education from Fordham University and a second in Educational Counseling from Queens College. He further pursued a post graduate degree in Marriage and Family Counseling with a specialization in Alcoholism; and completed his doctoral dissertation as a practitioner/researcher.

His significant contributions include the implementation and facilitation of therapeutically diverse programs that have impacted the lives of many, such as: self-contained bicycle touring for at-risk youth; after school rock climbing; service projects; group counseling with adolescents affected by addiction; sobriety maintenance groups; and self-management through martial arts.

Since his official retirement, Louis has been an adjunct professor at Hunter College's Counseling Department. He and his wife, Yolanda, reside in Upstate NY and spend winters in Puerto Rico.


